

## Tanana City School District Officially Merging with YKSD! Superintendent Boyd

On March 12, 2024, the Local Boundary Commission determined the City of Tanana is eligible to be reclassified under AS 29.04.045. The truncated petition documents were submitted and approved.

Per AS 29.04.045(c), the city council has 30 days to reject this reclassification. If the city council does not reject the reclassification, the reclassification will take effect on July 1, 2024.

With this approval, and pending no rejection to the reclassification, Tanana City School District will officially merge with YKSD July 1,2024!

### YKSD Board Expansion and District Resectioned Effective July 1, 2024

In time for the next school board cycle in October 2024, YKSD will expand from a seven member board to a nine member board. The new boundary lines for YKSD will include Tanana City School District and the voting sections will likely change. The proposed MAPS generated by the Local Boundary Commission (LBC) will be released for public comment in the near future. Essentially, input received from the district and community members is taken under advisement with the LBC finalizing the MAPS to ensure the new sections are balanced.

### HB 193 Increase in internet speed for schools

The Alaska Legislature passed <u>HB 193</u> as was transmitted to Governor Dunleavy for signature. Through the enactment of HB 193, rural and remote schools across Alaska will now benefit from much faster internet download speeds of 100Mbps. Currently most schools in YKSD are at 25 Mbps. This critical enhancement will empower students to remain competitive with their counterparts statewide and enable educators to employ innovative teaching methods utilizing technology.



## Assessments

Students completed the Winter MAP reading and math and DIBELS reading assessments which showed good progress in all areas. Students are now preparing for the State of Alaska AK Star test which



will be administered in late March and April. Schools are working on their schedules and will share the dates with parents. Please ensure your students get plenty of sleep to help them do their best on the tests.



A new reading program, Amplify Core Knowledge Language Arts (CKLA) has been purchased for grades K-5. This new program follows the Science of Reading components. The district will be providing training for the teachers this spring and additional training in August in order to start strong with the new reading program.

# ASTAR Grant Gears Up in YKSD

The Yukon Koyukuk School District received a grant from the US Department of Education. This grant is called the "ASTAR" grant (Alaska Serving Teachers Accomplishing Retention). This grant will provide the

district with about \$500K per year over the next five years to facilitate recruiting and training teachers from within the river communities of the district. This is called a "grow your own" program for short. If successful there will be several positive outcomes for the river communities.

- I. Reduced teacher turnover resulting in better instruction outcomes.
- 2. Improving the local economy by providing good paying professional jobs to local residents that don't require leaving home.
- 3. Providing successful local role models for district students
- 4. Providing culturally aware and relevant instruction to students in all subject areas
- 5. Provide a wider choice of career options to local students.

The ASTAR grant hired Arne Erickson to be the Teacher Retention Leader on January 22. Mr. Erickson is originally from Tok, Alaska and a 1987 graduate of UAF. Arne taught and coached basketball for 25 years in rural Alaska in the communities of Shishmaref, Hoonah, and Galena before retiring from full time teaching in 2013. Arne will be visiting all ten of the river schools this semester telling our students about the opportunities available to them for a career in education and how the YKSD can help to make that dream a reality for them. He has visited Ruby and Allakaket so far. Mr. Erickson will also be working with the paraprofessionals (teacher aides) at the river schools helping them to get on a plan to become designated as "highly qualified" by the Alaska Department of Education. This will help our district get into compliance with Alaska regulation <u>4 AAC 04.220</u> and allow our paraprofessionals to qualify for a pay increase. Mr. Erickson will be working at the CTE building when he is not out working at the river schools.

## The Alaska System of Academic Readiness (AKSTAR)

Alaska's Department of Education and Early Development (DEED) has partnered with NWEA to implement a creative approach to balanced statewide assessment that better reflects learning throughout the school year and helps educators target instruction to students' individual needs. The Alaska System of Academic Readiness (AK STAR) is designed to streamline the testing experience for grades 3–9 in the areas of English language arts (ELA) and mathematics. - The test window will be Monday, March 25, 2024 and ending on Friday, April 26, 2024.
- Practice tests are now posted and will be sent to teachers this week.
- Why should my child take the statewide summative assessment?

### Alaska Science Assessment

The Alaska Science Assessment is s a summative assessment designed to measure a student's (in grades 5, 8, and 10) knowledge of the K-12 Science Standards for Alaska, adopted in June 2019. The K-12 Science Standards for Alaska provide a new foundation for defining what students should know and be able to do in terms of scientific knowledge and skills.

The K-12 Science Standards for Alaska support learning and understanding through sense making and investigations associated with scientific phenomena in life science, physical science, earth and space science, and engineering and technology. Crosscutting concepts, an organizational framework for connecting knowledge from the diverse science disciplines into a coherent and scientifically based view of the world, are included in the standards. Science and engineering practices, <u>Alaska Standards for Culturally Responsive Schools</u>, and evidence-based reasoning are also included.

## ACCESS for ELLs

ACCESS for ELLs is a secure large-scale English language proficiency assessment for students who have been identified as English Learners (ELs). ACCESS for ELLs is aligned with the WIDA English Language Development (ELD) Standards and assesses each of the four language domains of Listening, Speaking, Reading, and Writing. Alaska has adopted the 2007 WIDA ELD Standards (Alaska Regulation 4 AAC 04.155). ACCESS for ELLs is given annually in WIDA Consortium member states to monitor student's progress in acquiring academic English. ACCESS for ELLs must be administered to all identified ELs in the State of Alaska anytime during the test administration window of **February I – March 31** (Alaska Regulation 4 AAC 34.055(c)).

### National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP)

The National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP), also known as "the Nation's Report Card," is the only nationally representative and continuing assessment of what America's students know and can do in various subject areas. Its two major goals are to measure student achievement and to report change in performance over time. Schools participating in the spring: Tanana, Huslia, Kaltag, Ruby.

## Dynamic Learning Maps (DLM) Alternate Assessment

**The Alternate Assessment** is administered to students with significant cognitive disabilities who are instructed and assessed on alternate achievement standards (Essential Elements). A Student's IEP team makes the determination if a student qualifies for the alternate assessment.

The Alternate Assessment is untimed and individually administered. The assessments are comprised of selected response items and modified constructed response items

## MAP Testing

We are currently in the winter testing window for MAP Testing.

Spring MAP- For spring all students in grades 3-9 will be taking the AKSTAR assessment which is combined with the spring MAP growth. Leaving students in the following grades to take the spring NWEA Measures of Academic Progress, MAP

Grades K, I, 2, 10, 11 for Math Grades 10 & 11 for reading

The spring assessment window opens April 8-26, 2024. For students scoring below the average range in Reading and Math on MAP, teachers will set individual goals for students in Response to Intervention (RTI) plans.

<u>STAR Reading</u>- All students in grades K-2 will be doing taking the STAR assessment in reading and also be used for interventions. Results have been shared at parent teacher conference.

# Denaakkenaage' Hunek, Denakenaga' Khunek: Native Language News

## Language Classes

**Denaakk'e Classes 2023-24:** The first half of the second semester went extremely well and online classes continue to be a success. It's great to see the kids back in classes after the weeklong Spring Break. You can always feel the kid's renewed energy after a mid-semester break.

**Recap:** Overall, throughout the year I have been seeing a lot of growth in my Denaakk'e classes, especially those that have been signing on consistently. When the teacher is invested with the students and practicing outside of classes it makes a huge difference in their retention, pronunciation, confidence, and participation during their scheduled class time with me. It's good to see our kids learning and understanding their language!

Currently we have 16 classes signed up for Native Language. With representation from all three dialects **Lower, Central, & Upper**; as well as our subdialects **Central – KR** and **Central – YR**.

Classwork Update: To start the year, we began in Units 9 – Łeek Eent'aanee'? and Unit 10 – Saanh Ggaagge Hodee? before moving into the beginning of the workbook. Using this approach gave students more time to learn about colors and birds in units 9 & 10; rather than rushing through it at the end of the school year. During the Second Quarter we worked through Unit 1 – Nedaats'e Ne'ooze'? & Unit 2 – Do'eent'aa?

Quarter Three we completed Unit 3 – Sezek (My Body) & Unit 4 – Donaalt'aayee? (How Many Are There?) and we were able to start Unit 5 – Dohoot'aa? (What's the Weather) before Spring Break. To start off Quarter Four, we picked back up where we left off in our weather unit and are right on schedule to finish the workbook by end of year.

While students in his early elementary classes have been receiving additional Language instruction and Native Singing & Dancing practice.

**Update on Site Visits**: One of Tristan's goals is to visit other villages throughout the school year to provide weeklong culture classes to our other nine sites. To date he has visited Kaltag (December), Huslia (January), Ruby (March), & will be in visiting Koyukuk (May) at the end of the year. Projects that he has worked on at the listed sites are mittens, hats, key chains, and Native Singing & Dancing with the communities in the evenings.

**Future Plans:** He has plans to visit YKSD's other 5 sites (Hughes, Allakaket, Rampart, Tanana, and Minto starting next school year)

## Curriculum & Materials

**Updated Workbook Edition 2024**: Something to look forward to, later this fall is our new edition of the NL workbooks along with new and improved teacher kits for school year 2024-25. New workbooks will include a 5-unit expansion; with new curriculum material on (Classroom, Plants & Berries, Camping, Fishing, & Moose).

### **Future Projects:**

Some exciting news from our NL program is a new project that is under development to expand our program! Last month in February I was able to make a trip to St. Ignatius, Montana with our State & Federal Programs Director Scott MacManus.

During our visit we spent the week developing an Early Childhood Native Language Kit with our partners Native Teaching Aids & Brightways Learning. My vision for this kit is to bring Native Language not only to our Pre-K students, but to start in the homes with ages 0-5 years of age, and to empower parents as their teachers. A piece that I see missing in our NL program is that our Language is only being practiced during school months. With an Early Childhood Kit, we can get it into the homes and start Language learning at birth, so that families are learning together.

The kits design is built around providing materials and resources that are user friendly with interactive activities interweaved throughout the units with sensory manipulatives. Parents will be able to independently teach and learn Denaakk'e with their children during their early development years at home, so that they have a solid foundation in their language before moving into structured lessons in kindergarten. With Pre-K classrooms and parents in mind we plan to offer large kits for Pre-K programs, and a second option that has three parent choice kits: **Kit One:** 0-18 Months, **Kit Two:** 18 Months - 3 years, & **Kit Three:** 3-5 years.

Developing this kit his has been a goal of mine as a Native Language teacher for over a year and it's beyond exciting to see it in its beginning stages. Tentative kit release date: Fall 2025!

**In the Works:** Fun interactive virtual exploration game for Native Language upper grade levels (9-12<sup>th</sup> Grade). More information at a later date.



Dear River Schools Community,

As we journey through the spring semester, we're excited to share some significant updates and initiatives happening within our school district. From technology advancements to infrastructure enhancements, our commitment to providing the best possible educational environment remains steadfast.

### SB-140 and BAG Grant

Since its inception in 2014, the Broadband Assistance Grant (BAG) has been a vital resource in supporting our schools' technological needs. Originally aimed at achieving 10 Mbps download speeds, the grant has evolved over the years. In 2020, thanks to the efforts of the Alaska State Legislature, schools were able to upgrade to 25 Mbps download speeds. Now, with SB-140 on the horizon, we're looking forward to potentially increasing these speeds to an impressive 100 Mbps. The Yukon-Koyukuk School District stands ready to leverage these funds effectively. We're prepared to enhance our connectivity, ensuring that our students and educators have the resources they need to thrive in today's digital age.

### **Technology Projects and Status**

Starlink for Teacher Housing: Internet access is more than just a convenience; it's a necessity, especially for our dedicated educators. We've recently acquired equipment for all YKSD-owned housing units, with installation set to commence in Minto as soon as possible as the school remodel has impacted reliable internet access. We understand the importance of providing this service to our teachers and are committed to ensuring they have the tools they need to excel.

*Websites:* Our Technology Department is hard at work revamping our online presence. We recognize the significance of effective communication with our families and communities, which is why we're in the process of upgrading our website to a more modern platform. Stay tuned for the launch of our new website by July 1st, aimed at enhancing engagement and accessibility for all stakeholders.

*Synergy SIS*: Efficient communication and streamlined processes are essential components of a successful educational system. That's why we're excited to announce our transition to a new Student Information System (SIS). This platform will not only improve communication with our families but also integrate all our existing systems and programs under one application. We're on track to implement this upgrade for the upcoming school year, ensuring a more cohesive and efficient experience for all.

*Phone System:* Effective communication is key, especially in areas where local phone service can be unreliable. Recognizing this challenge, we're working diligently to replace our current phone system. The new platform will not only enhance communication with our families but also provide us with greater flexibility when navigating issues with local telephone utilities. Deployment has already begun for Raven, and we're on target to roll out this upgrade to all River schools by next school year.



## Career Explorers in YKSD

The Career Explorers curriculum, part of YKSD's CTE program, continues to move forward. Career Explorers encourages students in our river communities to explore career options and prepare for post-secondary education, training, and employment. This semester Jeff Walters visited two additional sites (Ruby and Allakaket) to administer career counseling lessons. Melissa Good continues her distance-delivery AKCIS (Alaska Career Information System) lessons once or twice a month with most sites. We were also pleased to welcome two new employees. Brian Powell will facilitate Life Skills lessons and assist with grant management. Arne Erickson is focusing on YKSD's partnership with Chadron State University in Nebraska on our "Grow Your Own" teacher program. Specifically, Arne is helping to identify and support students, paraprofessionals, and community members as they begin working towards state teacher certification.

The CTE program has also been busy with several exciting opportunities! In January, nine students participated in a week-long welding certification class in Fairbanks. Then, from January 29-February 6, twenty-eight YKSD students in grades 6-8 traveled to Anchorage for ANSEP (Alaska Native Science & Engineering Program). In late February, thirteen students traveled to Juneau for the annual EdRising conference. Additional student opportunities are coming up soon, including an AHEC (Area Health Education Centers) training in Fairbanks at the end of March (juniors and seniors can earn 2 UAA health credits!), also a statewide SkillsUSA conference in Fairbanks at the end of March, and a Career Explorers camp for juniors and seniors in Nulato in mid-April. We're excited to provide these opportunities for our students!




