

Elders Biography Project


Under the guidance of our School Board, YKSD is continuing collaboration with community members throughout our District to preserve the history and culture of our Elders. The Elders Biography Team has conducted interviews with Elders from Ruby and Koyukuk communities this school year. One aim of this initiative is to involve students in gathering these narratives and developing curriculum materials that can be used district-wide, thereby honoring our Elders.



ASTAR Grant Activities

Arne Erickson, ASTAR & HQPP Projects

The ASTAR grant is a 500K grant from the Federal Department of Education. The goal of the ASTAR grant is to recruit, train, and retain local community members to work as teachers and school leaders in the YKSD river schools. The desired outcomes of this grant will be reduced teacher turnover and greater local selfdetermination, resulting in improved student achievement. Arne Erickson was hired on January 22nd, 2024 to be the teacher retention mentor/leader and promote ASTAR grant opportunities to students, paras, and interested community members in the river schools. Arne has been traveling to the river sites doing a presentation to the middle and high school students on the opportunities and benefits in education careers presented by the ASTAR grant. Arne has also met individually with the paraprofessionals at each site to either document their Highly Qualified status in compliance with the Alaska Department of Education's regulation <u>4 AAC 04.220</u>. Arne has visited 8 of the river schools so far (Ruby, Allakaket, Kaltag, Rampart, Nulato, Koyukuk, Tanana, & Huslia) and presented ASTAR to 91 students, 5 community members, 13 teachers, and 26 paraprofessionals. YKSD currently has 14 people in the river sites who have expressed interest in education careers (2 students, 12 paraprofessionals). 4 persons have actually enrolled in Chadron college and 1 paraprofessional has begun education classes. 3 Native American paraprofessionals traveled to Chadron State College as chaperones and learned about the Para to Teacher program offered at Chadron and the services provided through Chadron for paras to train to become teachers without having to leave their home communities. Plans are in the works to set up a professional development training this summer for the Native American teachers currently serving in the district river schools. The goal of this training will be to increase culturally relevant education methods and improve student outcomes. So far 3 Native American from YKSD have signed up to attend.

Career & Technical Education

Village Career Explorers & Capstone

Village Career Explorers is a 2-to-3-day CTE course offered each semester to juniors and seniors in YKSD river schools. This class aims to prepare students with practical career-seeking skills for life after high school and is taught with support from UAF-College of Business & Security Management and the Tanana Chiefs Conference GO program. In November, due to bad weather, the course had to be offered in Fairbanks and four students participated. This spring the course was taught by UAF instructors Amanda Langhorst and Jillian Bjornstad Kates in Nulato April 16-18. Seven students—six from Nulato and one from Tanana—successfully completed the spring class and gained skills and knowledge necessary to enter the workforce. Students researched and analyzed careers and job opportunities, developed professional resumés and cover letters, and practiced job interview skills. At the end, they earned 0.25 YKSD credit, one UAF credit, and a stipend from TCC. Students in both semesters did a fantastic job!


